Dr Nazila Ghanea is Lecturer in International Human Rights Law at the University of Oxford and Senior Visiting Fellow at the University of London. She was previously MA Convenor at the Centre for International Human Rights at the University of London, Institute of Commonwealth Studies (2000-2006) and a Visiting Research Fellow at the Lauterpacht Research Centre for International Law at the University of Cambridge (2004).

She is the Editor-in-Chief of the international academic journal by Brill publishers *Religion and Human Rights*. Her research lies primarily in the areas of freedom of religion or belief, minority rights, the UN human rights machinery and human rights in the Middle East.
